A description of the design elements and their meanings is listed below:

Stage Backdrop Mural

This design brings together the school's faction colours and bird mascots, all converging at the centre to represent unity. An additional turquoise hue is included to symbolise Broome's vibrant turquoise waters, which surrounds and connects our town. The other elements depict the mudflats and Roebuck Bay.

Green Design:

Represents the engagement and support the school provides to its students.

Red Design:

Symbolises friendships both within and outside of school, emphasising mutual support among peers.

Yellow Design:

 Reflects family dynamics, particularly the nurturing and support that foster growth and independence in our children.

Blue Design:

Highlights the community's connection to the school, welcoming everyone to the grounds.

The plane, people, fish and tree symbols represent our connection to the airport, the school's theme of flight, and learning about and being on country.

This section features our school motto, 'Working Together' in Yawuru and our Gouldian Finch mascot, Pilot, signing our core values.



Parent Information Booklet: Attendance SMS

Transitioning to the new System

Roebuck Primary School is transitioning to a new system, this means all Attendance SMS messages will now come from a new contact RoebuckPS

The new system will notify parents, guardians, and caregivers of unexplained absences or late arrivals.

What will change for Parents?

The new system starts on 28/10/2024 It will send parents an SMS on their mobile phone when their child is marked absent without an explanation.

Parents should delete the old Absentee SMS number to avoid confusion. They should not use it to communicate with the school.

This is a sample message. Parents will get this SMS with the link if their child is marked absent without an explanation. Parents should use this link to add attendance notes about their child's absence. Please note that the link will be valid for only 48 hours. Do not reply to this message via SMS as the school will not receive it. The school will receive your response via the link provided. Ensure the phone is connected to an Internet data plan or has WIFI access to use the hyperlink.
