


Prior to camp, payment plans may be negotiated with the Principal.

SCHOOL UNIFORM POLICY

A school's dress code can play an important role in promoting a positive image of the school and creating a sense of identity and supports our focus on a safe and inclusive school environment.

The School Board has endorsed the following school uniform policy to reflect the school colours of maroon and black.

- **School shirt:** the school shirt is maroon with grey trim and has a collar. It has the school logo embroidered on the front left side.
- ♦ Year 6 Leavers Shirt: The school shirt has the maroon side colours and the Broome Aboriginal design watermark. Central panels front and back are black. The school logo is front left breast, and the back has the names of students and staff.
- Sports Shirt: Each faction shirt is the same layout as the Yr 6 Leavers shirt except the colour (Yellow, Red, Green and Blue) replaces the black front and back panelling. The name of each faction is on the back in English and Yawuru. Sport shirts can be worn on Wednesday or any phys-ed / sport days in which the student is participating.
- School pants and skirts: Students wear black skirts, skorts, shorts or long pants. A school dress is also available. The length of the shorts/skirts/skorts or dresses MUST be to the middle of the thigh.
- Denim clothing: No denim clothing is to be worn at school.
- ♦ Headwear: All students must wear a maroon broad-brimmed hat, maroon bucket hat (K-6) as part of the uniform. Children without these Sunsmart-compliant hats will not be permitted to play in uncovered outdoor areas.
- Footwear: suitable footwear is deemed to be sandals with back straps or runners. Thongs and roller blade shoes are not to be worn at school. Any deviation requires a medical certificate or parent note to be passed to the classroom teacher.
- ♦ **Jewellery:** children who have their ears pierced are required to wear sleepers or studs in the piercing whilst at school. Other jewellery that may pose a catching hazard, e.g. large neck chain, dangly earrings etc are not to be worn.
- Hair: children with long hair must have their hair tied back.
- Physical Education: Students wear appropriate footwear for sporting activities and sports days.



MOBILE PHONE POLICY



The Department of Education does not permit student use of mobile phones in public schools unless for medical or teacher directed educational purpose. The policy aims to reduce distractions in class and improve student engagement. If your child needs to contact you, they can do so through the school administration. Likewise, if you need to get a message to your child, you can call the school.

Policy Rules

Mobile phone use, including smartwatches, by students is banned from the time they arrive to the conclusion of the school day ("off and away all day") unless the student has been granted an exemption for the following uses of mobile phones: - to monitor a health condition as part of a school approved documented health care plan. Students are

required to put their smart watches in 'aeroplane mode' so phone calls and messages cannot be sent or received during the school day. Students who bring a phone to school must, upon arrival, hand it in to the front office, where it will remain until collected, as the student leaves the school. Phones will not be released for student use during the day. Breaches of this will be managed in accordance with the School Behaviour Management Policy and Procedures.

BIKE SAFETY— HELMETS

Wearing a helmet can help protect a cyclist from serious injury if they fall off their bike and hit their head. It is the law for all cyclists to wear a bike helmet in WA. Helmets should be AS/NZA 2063 standard to ensure that they offer effective protection. The helmet must also be fitted correctly to ensure maximum comfort and protection and must be fitted without a hat or any other obstruction on your head. The 2-4-1 guide (see picture) can assist in ensuring your child's helmet fits correctly. Children can be taught how to fit their own helmet correctly using this simple guide.



If a helmet has been in a collision it may not be used again and must be replaced.

Just over 12 months ago the Broome Brass program started and this year we have 46 students involved. Each week there are group lessons given at school and we are running two brass bands, a senior and junior. Each Monday morning our excited and brilliant new recruits have been arriving at Broome North PS for a 7:00 am start and the seniors stay for an extra hour after school on a Tuesday afternoon.

The program has grown enough that a second brass teacher has been brought into the fold and we are delighted to have the expertise of Mr Peter Murnane (who is also the classroom music teacher at Roebuck Primary School). He brings along with him a fabulous past of playing the Euphonium in Melbourne in multiple community bands and a vibrant energy that can be seen in his student's enthusiasm to learn. Ms Hannah Trewartha has been a brass teacher for 20 years and also played, coordinated and conducted multiple community groups in Melbourne and, country NSW and Victoria before moving here to teach classroom music at Broome North PS.
