

#### **CLEANAWAY INCURSION**

On Monday 10 June we had a visit from Jeremy from Cleanaway. Cleanaway deal with all of our rubbish. He came to tell us about what we should and should not recycle. Here is what we learnt:

There are five things we need to recycle.

- ◊ Paper
- Ocardboard
- ◊ Metal
- O Plastics labelled with land 2. Make sure to take the lids off.
- ♦ Glass bottles and jars, but not broken glass.

Here are some things we cannot recycle.

- Soft plastics. Take to Coles and Woolies and put in the big soft plastics bins that they have near the checkout counters.
- Old clothes. Take them to the Op Shops.
- OPlastics that are not land 2.
- Tetra packs because they have aluminium inside.

Always wash your recyclables before putting them in the bin. Please don't put your recyclables in a plastic bag. Make sure you don't put non recyclables in the recycling bin, especially things that are a bit yukky like dirty nappies. In Broome all our recycling is sorted by hand so it's not nice for the people to have to pick out things like this. Happy recycling!

#### **MESSAGE FROM THE SCHOOL NURSE**

#### **School Entry Health Assessment**

All children in Western Australia are offered a health assessment during their first year of primary school. This usually occurs in Kindergarten and is provided by the local School Health Nurse. This is an excellent opportunity to look at the health and development of each child at the beginning of school life.

At Roebuck Primary School, the Kindy assessments start in Term 3.

The assessments are simple, standard tests which are non-invasive, quick and easy. The tests screen for problems which are best addressed, if picked up and treated early. The tests include:

- Vision and hearing checks
- 'Lift the lip' assessment
- Growth assessment including weight, height and Body Mass Index
- Developmental evaluation according to parent responses on the form
- Teacher and nurse observations
- Any other health, development and wellbeing concerns raised by parents

Your child's results will be sent home after their health check has been completed. Results are always treated confidentially.

Please note, the screening tests indicate if there <u>may</u> be a problem; they do not diagnose a condition. If the test results for your child suggests there may be a problem, the School Health Nurse will contact you to talk about further assessment and possible referral.

The last week of Term 2 has been a hive of activity at Roebuck Primary School as we celebrate NAIDOC Week. The students have participated in a range of activities:

- Ibis 4 and Spoonbill 2 attended the NAIDOC Opening Ceremony, including the Reconciliation Walk
- Greenshank 3 and Spoonbill 1 enjoyed a walk along the Minyirr Park track
- Our incredible Choir sang at Broome Primary School
- An amazing whole school NAIDOC Assembly
- Block activities, including face painting, making friendship bracelets in the NAIDOC colours, painting, creating window displays
- Culminating in the NAIDOC Cup between Jalangardi's (Whimbrel and Ibis) and Goolils (Spoonbill and Greenshank)





On Friday 28 of June Spoonbill 1 and Greenshank 3 were lucky enough to represent Roebuck on the Minyirr Park walk. A local Indigenous guide, Preston, taught us about many varieties of native trees and plants. Many of the trees and plants were used as medicine and tools.

That day we learnt about Gubinge (Kakadu Plum), Gumamu (Sandalwood), Nyillinyilil, Wganarnajina (Sandpaper Fig), Goolyi (Bowerbird Plant), Jarnba (Mistletoe Tree), Gungkara (Conkerberry), Nawulu (Blackberry Tree), Guwal (Snowball Bush), Jinjalguriny (Crab Eye Vine), Ant Hill and spear grass.

Fun Fact....

Did you know that the ant hill is used as medicine for belly aches but you must dig inside of the ant hill first to get the clean part because you wouldn't like to eat the yucky part! At the end of the Minyirr Park walk we reviewed on some things that we learnt about, including the fact that if a bird eats fruit from a tree, then it is also safe for humans to eat! We would like to thank Miss Marika for organising this excursion.
